

## **The Joint Venture Committee for Costa Rica**

Many of you are aware of the Joint Venture Committee model for the United Reformed Churches in doing mission work. Under this model, the work of missions falls directly under individual Church Consistories. The Consistory appoints a committee called the Joint Venture Committee to oversee the work of a mission that is under their care.

In that the individual Church is not to do this alone, there are various churches represented on any given Joint Venture Committee. So on our Joint Venture Committee Costa Rica, Trinity URC, Cornerstone URC, and Thunder Bay URC are represented. This makes it a little difficult for those churches that are not local to participate at the monthly meetings. At our March meeting we took advantage of current technology and were able to include our brothers from Thunder Bay, Canada, by means of video conferencing. This will become a very valuable tool as we

incorporate them in our decision making on a real time basis.

Also at our March meeting we had a report by "Be Accountable." This is the June and Dave Freswick team that went to Costa Rica to report on the accounting for the Tepeyac school building, school administration, and CUR. They also were able to answer several questions the Committee had posed for them before they left for Costa Rica. It was an extensive report, one well overdue. Many good suggestions were made, particularly in methods and program use for accounting. It was a very good report regarding the work in Costa Rica. Many of our questions were answered and it gave us a better understanding of the financial aspect and planning of what goes on behind all the work in Costa Rica.

As many of you may also know we have a new missionary and his family working alongside Rev. Green and Aletha. Nick Lamme has been called by the Trinity URC to be a missionary in Costa Rica. Originally Nick went to Costa Rica on a trial basis.

Having heeded the call to continue in mission work, he accepted the call from Trinity. Nick comes from the OPC and will undergo a Classis examination in June so that he will be a pastor in the URC. Nick currently is assisting the church of Cartago. He also helps Rev. Green in editing for CUR and teaches at the Tepeyac School.

The building of the high school has continued. It is a very slow process in that we can only go at the pace funding is available and work teams come down. This year several groups have come down; this includes Bethany URC, Little Farms OPC, Thunder Bay URC, and Chino URC. We have one more group scheduled in June. Working at this pace has many drawbacks, one being rules tend to change as new people get into government administration. The school has to keep adjusting to the new requirements, thus adding cost to construction. An example is the latest requirement to do an engineering hydraulic study. This studies the flow of water over the property. Cost is approximately \$9,000.00.

As you can see, we would like to see the pace of construction pick up. To do this, funding is needed. In that nearly all the funding comes through donations from the churches and individuals in North America, a subcommittee of the Joint Venture Committee is being organized thanks to Jeff Kortman. This committee will seek donations from individuals belonging to churches familiar with the work in Costa Rica who will give on a regular basis. Twenty individuals from 25 churches giving 5 dollars a week will generate \$10,000.00 a month, a goal that will allow us to have construction crews on site year round. Please contact Jeff with your desire to help.

We praise God that we can be a witness to the work that goes on in Costa Rica for the expansion of His Kingdom through the work of His people, whether it be preachers at the various churches, teachers at the school, those working for CUR and those working with their hands at the new school.

## **Bethel URC of Jenison reports on the Ministry of Rev. Steve McGee**

We wish to share with you the following letter, which was sent to those Churches and individuals who support us, from our Elders at Bethel United Reformed Church, Jenison, MI.

"Dear Supporting Brethren,

We want to thank you for your faithfulness both in prayers and financial support of Mission Trinidad. We are writing to share some exciting news regarding Mission Trinidad and the work of Rev. Steve McGee. We are happy to report the expansion of Rev. McGee's ministry and Mission Trinidad to extend to the entire Caribbean and Latin American regions. This will be accomplished through his appointment as President of Ministries In Action (MIA).

Rev. McGee will assume the duties of Rev. Dr. Walford Thompson, who has served as the President of MIA for the past thirty years. Dr. Thompson is seeking to retire and will continue to serve as Ambassador at Large for MIA. We, as the elders and overseers of Rev. McGee and Mission Trinidad, have gone through a lengthy process of investigation and discussion

before giving approval for Rev. McGee to proceed with this ministry expansion. We formulated many questions for Rev. McGee to answer prior to his visit to Bethel URC for additional evaluation by Bethel's Consistory here in Jenison.

We would like to share with you some of the questions and answers that we wrestled with as a Consistory so that you may better understand the open doors that God has opened to Bethel URC and the URC at large.

### **What is MIA and what is it about? What is the relationship between MINTS, MIA, and Mission Trinidad?**

Ministries in Action (MIA) is a 501C Faith Mission Agency, founded initially in 1961 by Rev. Terry Gyger (an ordained PCA minister and presently the Director of the International Church Planting effort of Redeemer Presbyterian Church in Manhattan, NY). In 1977, E. Walford Thompson was asked to serve as the president of MIA, having served the organization as its Director in the Caribbean. Dr. Thompson is an ordained minister in the PCA and serves as an Elder of Old Cutler Presbyterian Church in Miami, Florida, and is part of the co-founding team of Miami International Seminary (MINTS).

MIA is governed by a twelve member Board of Directors; ten are members of the Presbyterian Church in America (PCA).

Students work toward a Certificate or Diploma of Theology, or an Associate Degree in Christian Counseling taught by professors from Reformed Theological Seminary, Jackson, MS. MIA is a co-founder of MINTS, together with Old Cutler Presbyterian Church (Miami, FL) and the

Joint Venture Committee of Dr. Neal Hegeman of the URC. Dr. Hegeman is the Dean of Students of MINTS and is a full time MIA missionary, supported by the URC, living in Miami, FL. Rev. Allen Vander Pol, also a URC missionary, is the Academic Dean for MINTS residing in Cape Coral, FL, and Rev. Eric Pennings, a URC missionary, serves as Director for Central America for MINTS and resides in Toronto, Canada. The goal of MIA is to reform the Church in the Caribbean and Latin America by providing sound theological education to servant / leaders of Christ's Church, by using reputable reformed scholars as lecturers in their courses.

The following information describes the tri-fold approach of MIA in reforming the Church:

1. Theological Education: MINTS and Iona
2. Evangelism and Discipleship: MIA strategy for Church growth
3. Holistic Ministry: Project Ebenezer

Rev. McGee was on loan to MINTS as their Director for the English Speaking Caribbean. All MINTS facilitators that he works with in the Caribbean, with the exception of Belize, are full time MIA missionaries.

Mars Hill Institute of Biblical Theology in Trinidad is a MINTS study center. The connection between MINTS, MIA and Mission Trinidad has already been established.

### **Where will Rev. McGee be based?**

Rev. McGee and his family will be based in Miami, FL. This is necessary for several reasons:

- 1) The offices and staff for MIA have been in Miami for over forty years due to Miami's being the gateway to the Caribbean, Latin and South America.

2) Rev. McGee will be traveling extensively to Jamaica, Haiti, Belize, Central America, the Bahamas, and the upper and lower Caribbean. The location of Miami is essential to his traveling needs and will cut his traveling expenses in half.

3) Rev. McGee will continue to maintain the relationship with Rev. Gosyne and Covenant Reformed Evangelical Church in Trinidad, and Mars Hill Institute of Biblical Theology. (MINTS study center) Revs. Gosyne and McGee will continue their current radio broadcast. This will be accomplished through pre-recorded messages and live broadcasts when Rev. McGee is in Trinidad. Rev. McGee will continue to serve as an elder at CREC and will continue to recruit professors to write and teach at Mars Hill Institute, as well as all the MINTS study centers in the Caribbean. Mission Trinidad will benefit greatly from his involvement with MIA. MIA has a vast base from which to draw resources for ministry, i.e., work teams to build medical clinics, schools, churches, etc. Essentially, God has given Rev. McGee and Bethel URC the opportunity to multiply Mission Trinidad throughout the Caribbean and Latin America. Mission Trinidad is a mirror of several MIA's ministries (church planting, theological education and holistic ministry). This opportunity with MIA affords us the ability to multiply and expand. Mission Trinidad will not be limited to the island of Trinidad but will be a portion of a greater whole. We are convinced that God has opened this door! Rev. McGee and the URC will have a wider audience in which to work out our calling as the body of Christ in order to fulfill the Great Commission. Rev. McGee and his family moved to Trinidad in 2003 to do missionary work in areas of

theological education, evangelism, church planting and holistic ministry. The same ministry God called him to do will continue, not only in Trinidad, but throughout the Caribbean and Latin America. He will continue to train local pastors and future missionaries in all the above areas. This truly is the realization of 'the hope of a new reformation to sweep the Caribbean.' Join with us in praise and thanksgiving to our God's directing Rev. McGee, Bethel URC, and Mission Trinidad in reaching the Caribbean and Latin America.

4) Additional staffing in Trinidad will be provided with two additional missionaries with experience via Mexico: Chuck and Dawn Newell and Dallas and Anna Lee Ward.

#### **Who will oversee Rev. McGee's work and who will he be accountable to?**

The Elders of Bethel URC will continue to oversee his work with MIA. His ministerial credentials will continue to be held at Bethel URC. Rev. McGee will report to the Board of MIA and Bethel URC. He will continue to report on a monthly basis to the Elders of Bethel and his report to the MIA Board will also be included in his monthly report.

#### **What responsibilities will Rev. McGee continue with regarding Mission Trinidad? What happens to his relationship with Pastor Ricky Gosyne and his involvement with his present church responsibilities?**

Rev. McGee will continue to teach at the MINTS study centers located throughout the English speaking Caribbean which includes the MINTS study center located in Trinidad. He plans to be in Trinidad at least every other month to preach at Covenant Reformed Evangelical

Church (CREC) and visit with the missionaries and students working with CREC and Mars Hill. The work in Trinidad will continue as it always has. His involvement will be in overseeing the work and relationships with Bethel URC and other partners in ministry.

God has accomplished great things without the outlays of large amounts of monies and that Mission Trinidad has always operated with a small balance of funds. The rate of expanding this work will depend largely upon funds made available. We are so deeply thankful to the twenty churches and two individuals who have partnered with us in financial support for these past six years. To these supporters we humbly ask that they would consider an increase in their support, and to all other churches of URCNA we are asking you to partner with us financially to further the advance of this kingdom work.

## **Excerpts from McGee magazine**

Thank you again for your thoughts and prayers during our recent medical mission trip to Trinidad. Like last year, Cal did general medicine. However, he also was able to function as a medical oncologist and facilitate the evaluation and treatment of a young woman with a brain tumor. Hopefully, surgery will be occurring at Johns Hopkins in the near future. With this surgery and with the Lord's blessing, her life can be saved. Like last year, I did counseling but unlike last year, I had time both to do health education and to fit glasses. What fun! Psychologist turned optometrist! This was only the first of several surprises.

The next involved a medical clinic scheduled at a small school. We were prepared to spend the day seeing children. When we arrived, all of the chairs were filled with adults! Our plan was not God's plan! An additional surprise—or perhaps a miracle!—was that immediately upon our arrival in Trinidad, I met a young woman from the area who is committed to developing a safe house

for women and children. She shared the name of a local social worker who has the same goal. These names were passed on to both the American missionary, Rev. Steve McGee and, and the national pastor, Ricky Gosyne. In Trinidad, the crime rate is very high (over 500 murders on this small island in 2008). It is unsafe for people to go out at night and socialize. Life is extremely limited. In an effort to assist young people in meeting and worshipping with other youth, we discussed the possibility of the pastors meeting with the Trinidad Director of Youth for Christ in an effort to increase social interaction among Christian young people.

Please pray that both the safe house and the networking with Youth for Christ will prove workable. The church has been leasing space from a Muslim landlord. Recently he indicated that he did not want to rent to a Christian church. Trinidad is primarily Muslim and Hindu—only 28% are Christian. After unsuccessfully searching for another location, Ricky Gosyne decided to add a room to his house as a worship location. Until the room was finished, the new members' class, Sunday School, and Worship Service were held in the carport at the McGee's home. It was awesome to see the gracious and loving spirit with which the McGee family so freely and willingly shared their home for the last six weeks. When the new location was ready, Cal and I were privileged to help with the move. The worship area will seat about 60 people. The garage will be the Sunday School area. We learned a great deal on this mission trip, but perhaps the most impacting was how much more complicated life is in a less developed culture. The outdoor area is either muddy or dusty; water from the tap is unsuitable for drinking; because of crime,

the windows are covered with bars and the drapes are drawn 24/7; ticks and mosquitoes carry disease; and the list goes on and on. We came away both extremely appreciative of the sacrifices that our missionaries make and more fully understanding the importance of their being emotionally as well as financially supported by those of us back in the States. They treasure our loving cards, emails, and letters. We encourage you to remember the missionaries in your church. They serve the Lord under very challenging circumstances.

## **SIX BAPTIZED at Covenant Reformed Evangelical Church**

The Covenant Reformed Evangelical Church had the privilege of welcoming six new members into our fellowship. Deoraj Sankar, his wife, June and daughter, Katrina, Roxan Steeling, Sheana Graham and Stacy Bartholomew were administered the sacrament of holy baptism on the 7th of February. The Sankar family began coming to CREC after their children attended a VBS in Caroni last August. Stacy came by way of the four hour radio broadcast of "Renewing Your Mind" with Dr. R.C. Sproul.

MISSION TRINIDAD is a missionary work on the island of Trinidad, West Indies, and is a ministry of Bethel United Reformed Church, Jenison, MI. This missionary work is supported by several URC churches and individuals in North America and Canada.

Our purpose: to be faithful to the Great Commission. This goal is accomplished in three specific areas of evangelism, reformed church planting, and education. Rev. McGee's duties include teaching at MINTS Study Centers throughout the Caribbean, Latin America and Mars Hill

Institute of Biblical Theology, located in Central Trinidad; co-pastoring Covenant Reformed Evangelical Church, Chase Village, with Pastor Ricky Gosyne and hosting two radio broadcasts. MARS HILL LIVE, a theological talk program is broadcast the 2nd and 4th Sundays from 6:15—6:45 PM on 99.5 FM LIFE Radio. A four hour night broadcast (12:00—4:00 AM) the 2nd Tuesday morning of every month is heard on 98.1 FM ISAAC radio and features the teaching ministries of Dr. R.C. Sproul ("Renewing Your Mind"), Dr. Ravi Zacharias ("Let My People Think") and "The White Horse Inn" (Dr. Michael Horton, Rod Rosenblatt, Kim Riddlebarger and Ken Jones). Both programs give listeners the opportunity to call in with their questions or comments on the topic of that program. ## **SOUTH ORANGE COUNTY REFORMED BIBLE STUDY**

A ministry of Oceanside United  
Reformed Church

As far as I can remember, I've always believed in Jesus. I was raised in a Christian home, attending Calvary Chapel with my family until early adulthood. As I continued to read and study Scripture, however, I became more and more convinced that

Reformed theology was indeed the most faithful expression of the Gospel message. After earning a BA in history at Cal State in Swan Marcos, I attended Westminster Seminary California where I studied under such men as Robert Godfrey, Michael Horton, and David Van Drunen. I now have a Masters in Divinity, but more importantly, I feel properly equipped to serve the Church of Christ. I have a wonderful wife of almost 10 years, Kristin, and we have two boys who give us much joy.

To the north of where I live in Southern California, there are approximately 60 miles between my local church (Oceanside URC) and our sister congregation, Christ Reformed in Anaheim, in a county of over 3 million people! Even if one factors in other NAPARC churches in the Orange County area, he will find that they are few and far between. It is for this reason that the consistory of the Oceanside URC is convinced that there should be another URC in the south Orange County region (i.e., San Clemente, Dana Point, & San Juan Capistrano). As a charter member of my congregation and a graduate from Westminster Seminary California, I was recently ordained as an associate pastor by Oceanside URC. One of the tasks given to me as a new pastor was to inquire whether there are any people living in south Orange County who would be interested in attending a Bible study in the hopes that it may turn into a URC church plant. As of now, I have had a handful of families that have expressed interest and I hope that we can start a Bible study soon.

While I was in seminary, I began working in a local family restaurant and that continues to pay the bills. Having grown up in

north San Diego County (a 30-minute drive to the south), my family and I are established and we do not require any financial support (at this time). The beauty of working in a "tent-making" capacity is that we can take our time and see how things develop without having to make large financial commitments. We continue to hope and pray that the Lord will continue to add to His church and that if it be His will, another URC may be established in south Orange County.

## **NEW URC MISSIONARY IN MEXICO**

Rev. Richard Bout has been called and sent to Mexico by the Hope Reformed Church (URC) of Toronto, following is a letter from Rev. Bout.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

How does one plant a church in a foreign culture and country? We know from I Corinthians 1 that God has chosen "the foolishness of preaching" to call men to Himself. We know that Romans 10 explains that "faith comes by hearing and hearing by the Word of God." In our work in Mexico, it has been exciting to see the reality of this truth take place before our eyes. Having finished seminary and desiring to serve the Lord on the mission field, we were called by Hope Reformed Church of Toronto to labor in Eternal Life Mission in Tepic, Nayarit. This work was begun by Messiah's Independent

Reformed Church of Holland, Michigan. We joined Rev. Harry Bout in a church-planting work there.

In the beginning, the task seemed overwhelming. There were both cultural and language barriers. Mexico's culture is deeply rooted in Catholicism and pagan superstition. The willful ignorance of spiritual things and the trusting in an empty tradition to save are extremely difficult walls to break through. Would they listen to a stranger, a foreigner, someone who can barely speak their language? Would God choose to pierce through the thick darkness of sin? By the grace of God, with time we were able to see God opening doors for us to minister, person by person. We began with teams from Canada and the States assisting us in tract-distribution and children's programs. Contacts were made; children's clubs were established; home-Bible studies were started. We were invited into the state university to give English-conversation classes. We clearly began to see the Spirit of God begin to work in people's lives as they heard the message of the gospel:

Maria Guadalupe Esmerio was the first convert. She listened to the Scripture song: "Only in Christ is there salvation." She heard the preaching, "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life." Her husband Alfredo is now also a believer, and they are members with their two daughters. Martin Castillo and his mother Adela came to the mission out of a sect. He responded to a newspaper ad for ESL. He came to one English class, but has rarely missed a Bible study or worship service since. His wife Marta was converted under the preaching of the Word as well. They have faithfully attended the mission with their 3 children for 6 years. Martin's

walk with the Lord is evident to all, and he will be soon installed as an elder in the church. Don Jose saw our sign on the street, as did Paco Rentería's mother. Lizeth came through the insistent invitation of her grandmother who found us through a relative who attended the university English conversation workshops that we host. Maria de Jesus is a relative of Martin Castillo, and came after attending his weekly in-home Bible study. All these have publicly professed their faith and are serving in the church. Numerous others also attend our Bible studies and worship services. Our once empty chairs now are filled with up to 50 people on Sunday mornings. And all have a story. All are living with consequences for sinful life patterns. We are a motley crew indeed. And yet, it is exciting to see living proof of the truth of the gospel, ". . . but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more. . ."

How does one plant a church? There are many ways. But perhaps it starts with this realization: "So then neither he who plants is anything, nor he who waters, but God who gives the increase." A faithful missionary, who brings the Word as a humble servant and relies on the Lord to change the heart, may very well be privileged to see the Lord's harvest of souls.
